Hydrography of Perdido River  
Alabama & Florida,

The principal water trade of this river is towing logs and transporting (by sail) provisions from Pensacola Fla. to the logging camps in Alabama.

One mile above the confluence of the Black Water with the Perdido River, there is a store and black smith shop. A rail road runs from here to the logging camps, and is only used for hauling logs.

The Perdido River from its mouth to the mouth of the Black Water is deep and narrow, with a bar at its mouth, with but 10 feet at mean low water, while inside of the river 40 feet will be found. Good anchorages from all winds can be found in this river. Stevedore Henry A. C. A. A.
